Despite these complex conditions, FGEO has remained committed to its mission of empowering vulnerable communities through integrated humanitarian response, resilience building, and sustainable development programming.

This year's achievements reflect not only the delivery of essential humanitarian assistance, but also the strengthening of community systems that enable long-term recovery. Across multiple provinces, FGEO supported households affected by conflict, natural disasters, and chronic food insecurity, ensuring that assistance reached those most in need in a timely and dignified manner.

In Logar Province, FGEO implemented a large-scale Community Kitchen initiative that provided daily food support to hundreds of vulnerable households over an extended period. In Nangarhar, the organization responded swiftly to earthquake-affected communities, delivering emergency hot meals to stabilize families during crisis. In Zabul, FGEO has continued to invest in long-term resilience through greenhouse agriculture and solar fruit drying systems designed to improve livelihoods and reduce post-harvest losses.

These interventions reflect a consistent organizational philosophy: humanitarian action must not only save lives, but also strengthen dignity, self-reliance, and resilience.

We extend our sincere appreciation to our partners, particularly the United Nations Development Programme, for their continued trust and collaboration. We also acknowledge the dedication of FGEO staff working under challenging conditions to deliver impactful programs with professionalism and integrity.

We invite readers to review this report as a reflection of what is possible when communities, partners, and institutions work together toward a shared vision of resilience and hope.

OVERVIEW OF ACHIEVEMENTS

Summary of 2025 Achievements and Baseline for 2026 Outcomes

PROGRAM PORTFOLIO

In 2025, Future Generations Empowerment Organization (FGEO) successfully delivered humanitarian and resilience programs across three provinces despite a challenging economic environment. Implementing four distinct projects valued at approximately USD 569,159, the organization focused on reaching the most vulnerable through a dual strategy: providing immediate emergency food assistance while laying the groundwork for long-term agricultural development.

This approach addressed urgent needs in Logar and Nangarhar through food support, while simultaneously investing in productive infrastructure in Zabul. By equipping communities with climate-smart assets such as greenhouses and solar dryers, FGEO effectively bridged the gap between relief and recovery, ensuring that families not only met their immediate consumption needs but also gained sustainable tools for future food security and income generation.

The year's programming focused on two strategic pillars: providing life-saving humanitarian assistance to food-insecure households and establishing sustainable infrastructure for long-term economic resilience.



Key Sectorial Achievements 2025

01 Humanitarian Food Relief for Vulnerable Communities

- Logar Community Kitchen Project (Completed):** FGEO successfully completed Community Kitchen intervention in Logar Province with a total budget of USD 145,659. The project addressed acute food insecurity by providing daily fresh bread to 575 of vulnerable households over a period of 100 days. The intervention stabilized household food consumption, improved nutritional intake for children and women, and restored a sense of dignity to families facing extreme economic stress.
- Nangarhar Community Kitchen Project (Initiated):** In response to emerging needs, FGEO launched a Community Kitchen project in Dara-e-Noor District, Nangarhar Province, valued at USD 150,000. The project began in November 2025 and continued through January 2026. During the 2025, FGEO successfully established the operational framework, identified vulnerable beneficiaries, and commenced the distribution of daily hot meals to earthquake affected families during the harsh winter season. The intervention supported 88 households, reaching 616 indirect beneficiaries, through the provision of daily fresh hot meals for 90 days.



02 Climate-Smart Agriculture and Livelihoods

- **Establishment of Greenhouse Project (Initiated in 2025):** In Shajoy District, Zabol Province, FGEO initiated a climate-smart agriculture project with a budget of USD 136,500. Launched in October 2025, the project focuses on establishing 11 greenhouses to 11 households to enable year-round vegetable production. By the close of 2025, site selection and community mobilization were completed, and construction was underway to ensure production capacity for the 2026 harvest season.
- **Establishment of Solar Fruit Dryer Facility Project (Initiated in 2025):** Simultaneously, FGEO launched a post-harvest management initiative in Qalat, Zabol Province, valued at USD 137,000. Starting in October 2025, this project aims to install solar fruit dryers to reduce crop wastage and improve market value. By the close of 2025, site selection and community mobilization were completed.

Summary of Impact

These interventions demonstrate FGEO's dual commitment to saving lives through immediate humanitarian response while simultaneously building the foundations for sustainable livelihoods. The completion of the Logar project provided immediate relief, while the initiation of projects in Nangarhar and Zabul established a clear baseline and operational momentum for achieving significant development outcomes in 2026.



Surviving Without Shelter, Sustained by Community Support

Minha Bibi is a vulnerable widow living with her children after her husband went missing several years ago. Following the earthquake, her home was destroyed, and a temporary shelter was later lost due to a snowstorm. With no stable shelter or income, she and her children survive entirely on support from the Community Kitchen, which provides daily meals and prevents hunger during crisis conditions. She has expressed hope for continued assistance and requested vocational training opportunities such as tailoring and cooking to achieve long-term self-reliance and dignity

A Mother's Struggle for Survival and Hope After the Earthquake

Hussan Bibi is the sole provider for her family, including her blind husband and children. The earthquake severely damaged her home, increasing vulnerability and insecurity. She works as a daily laborer in wheat fields, but her income remains insufficient to meet basic needs. The Community Kitchen has become a critical lifeline, providing daily meals and reducing her burden during crisis. She has requested continuation of support to help families like hers survive ongoing hardship.

Restoring Dignity and Hope Through Community Kitchen Support

Yaqoob Bibi lives in extreme vulnerability, caring for her mentally challenged brother with no stable income or family support. Following the earthquake, her situation worsened significantly. The Community Kitchen provided her with essential meals, restoring stability and dignity during a period of extreme hardship. This support has enabled her to care for her brother with reduced stress and renewed hope.

Baseline for 2026

Alongside completed emergency project, FGEO initiated two major resilience projects in 2025 that are scheduled to continue and complete in 2026. These interventions, focused on sustainable agriculture and post-harvest value addition, establish a clear baseline for measuring long-term resilience outcomes in the coming year.

- Establishment of Greenhouse Initiative (Continuing to 2026) Initiated in 2025, this project is establishing 11 greenhouses in Zabul. While site selection and community mobilization were completed in 2025.
- Establishment of Solar Fruit Dryer Project (Continuing to 2026) Started in October 2025. this project aims to reduce post-harvest losses and will continues in 2026 to complete installation of 5 solar dryer and training on fruit processing and assesses the economic impact on women-led smallholder farming groups.
- Nangarhar Community Kitchen project (Continuing to 2026) While primarily an emergency response initiated in 2025, the project concluded in early 2026. The handover and final impact assessment will be finalized in the 2026 reporting period, ensuring a smooth transition from emergency relief to recovery.



Staffing and Capacity Building

As of December 2025, FGEO maintains a dedicated workforce of 57 staff member, comprising of 43 male and 123 female across its project sites in Logar, Nangarhar, and Zabul. The organization remains committed to gender inclusion and professional development.

In 2025, FGEO staff participated in capacity-building sessions focused on humanitarian principles, protection standards, and modern agricultural extension services. This investment in human capital ensures that FGEO delivers high-quality, dignified assistance to vulnerable populations.



MESSAGE FROM THE FGEO TEAM

In 2025, Future Generations Empowerment Organization (FGEO) continued to serve communities facing immense challenges. Amid economic uncertainty and natural disasters, our work remained grounded in one clear objective: empowering vulnerable communities to build resilience. The dedication of our staff on the ground ensured that life-saving assistance reached those who needed it most, often in difficult to access areas.

Our programs supported families affected by earthquakes in Nangarhar, addressed chronic food insecurity in Logar, and invested in sustainable agricultural livelihoods in Zabul.
